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Confidence Comer John F. Board In this week's Confidence Corner we will examine a few words from the Hebrew language that though they can be translated as a particular body part, also have other meanings when used in Scripture. As we have noted be-

fore, the Hebrew language has a much smaller vocabulary than does Koine Greek. This makes for a number of interesting nuances.

The first of the Hebrew terms that uses parts of the body metaphorically to describe emotion or thought process is the word often translated simply as "heart" (*leb/lev*). Though it is used of the physical heart (Exodus 28:29), sometimes it is used to indicate fear, regret, joy, comfort, love or anger (Psalm 27:3; Proverbs 19:3). It is also used of the human mind (Exodus 36:2 mind and heart are both *leb/lev*).

The Hebrew term for throat (*nephesh*) is often translated "life or soul." This word is sometimes used to describe deceit (Psalm 5:9), arrogance (Isaiah 3:16) or stubbornness (Psalm 75:5). Below I will attempt to show passages where the words mentioned above are used in different ways.

In Proverbs 6:16 the text literally states that there are seven things that are detestable to the LORD's (nephesh) "very being." Proverbs 16:30 notes that men do not despise a thief who steals to satisfy his hunger (nephesh—throat/hunger). Yet Proverbs 16:32 states that the adulterer lacks judgment and destroys himself (nephesh—his own life or soul). Back in verse 14 of this same chapter it states that the person who plans evil also has perversity in his soul (leb/lev—heart soul). Proverbs 16:32 again notes regarding the one who commits adultery, that he lacks good judgment (leb/lev-heart).

I think the passage above illustrates that there are various nuances to the Hebrew terms employed by the Holy Spirit in the Old Testament. It is so interesting to me that in the New Testament, God's final revelation to mankind, He chose Koine Greek as the language. There is no more precise language known to mankind, past or present, which can compare to Koine Greek.

I am thankful to God to be able to look into His Word (Old Testament or New Testament) and learn the truths conveyed by each. May God bless us as we study and put into practice the teaching of His Word!

Truly being found faithful when He returns is the only thing that matters--and speaking of being concerned about time--we surely don't want to face eternity in a place of torment. If we are with the Lord or in Hell, there will not be time, only eternity.
