How to Handle Snakes

Last Sunday we were looking at Jesus' teaching regarding our love for our enemies. Though I thought we had a good study as well as some good thoughts from our members, I wish I would have seen the following story so that I could have included it in our class.

The story is reported as follows: A man saw a snake being burned to death and decided to take it out of the fire. When he did, the snake bit him causing the man excruciating pain. The man dropped the snake and the reptile fell right back into the fire. So the man grabbed a metal pole and took the snake out of the fire and saved its life. Someone who was watching approached the man and said: "That snake bit you. Why are you still trying to save it?" The man replied, "The nature of the snake is to bite, but that is not going to change my nature, which is to help."

The lesson from the story is: Do not change your nature simply because someone harms you. Don't lose your good heart.

I think this story illustrates a good attitude to maintain especially when we are dealing with our enemies! Jesus obviously put it best when He enjoined His followers to love their enemies. "Do good to those who hate you" (Luke 6:27). In verse 31, Jesus continues, "Treat other people the way you want them to treat you."

Why is this important? The reason this is important is that even sinners are willing to do good to those who are good to them. If I am honest this teaching of Jesus is very difficult to master. Take for example the story of the man and the snake. What would you do if you were that man? I'm afraid that at the moment after the snake bit me and fell in the fire, I would probably think, "Serves you right you dumb snake."

I guess that is why we have to work so diligently to prepare ourselves for times when our enemies hurt us. If we fail to work to prepare ourselves for those times, we will simply react—and that reaction most likely will not be good.

So what about you? What are you doing to prepare yourself to treat others correctly when they mistreat you? A huge key is going to be our relationship with Deity. Do we pray and do we read Scripture in order to understand Deity. Do we, based upon that understanding, strive to act as the Godhead would act? It seems to me, the only way we can act as God would have us to act, is to make those necessary preparations ahead of time!

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
