Confidence Comer John F. Board In this week's Confidence Corner I want to look at a fascinating passage located in the book of 1 Kings. The passage is fascinating because it is a fulfillment of something that was recorded approximately 550 years

previous to the time of Ahab; the prediction was in the days of Joshua. Consider with me 1 Kings 16:34 which reads, "During the time of Ahab, Hiel from Bethel rebuilt the city of Jericho. It cost Hiel the life of Abiram his oldest son, when he began work on the city. And it cost the life of Segub, his youngest son, to build the city gates. Through Joshua (the son of Nun), the LORD had said that this would happen."

As noted above, the inspired prediction was first recorded in Joshua 6:26. This passage recorded these words, "Joshua laid an oath on them at that time, saying, "Cursed before the LORD be the man who rises up and rebuilds this city, Jericho." The LORD had pronounced a curse on anyone who violated God's ban against rebuilding Jericho on the old site.

Consider the following thoughts. First, even though 550 years had passed, the LORD and His Word were not forgotten. Time may have passed but what the LORD said would be fulfilled. Second, the LORD was powerful enough to carry out His oath.

Today, we would do well to remember that God is faithful to His Word. At times people may be tempted to forget or take lightly the promise of Jesus that He will return to the earth in Judgment. Almost 2000 years have passed since Jesus prophetically foretold His return. Time continues today, but make no mistake, Jesus is coming again and when He does time will be no more. His faithfulness also promises eternal blessings to those following Him. Rely upon the faithfulness of God to fulfill what He says, and live so that the end for you will be eternal joy.
