One place that I would love to visit is the rotunda of the National Archives. It is there that one of the greatest documents in American history (and arguably human history), the American Declaration of Independence is housed. As we probably remember from the movies, The Declaration of Independence rests under green-filtered glass in a bronze case filled with inert helium gas and is lowered every night into a climate-controlled vault some twenty-two feet below the floor.

As revered as *The Declaration of Independence* is to many, it pales in comparison to the document that is the basis for our spiritual freedom, the *Bible*. How Great the Destruction

According to an article on line, Paradise California is not the only place that has suffered destruction due to wildfires. An article on MSN webpage notes,

"Destructive wildfires are regular events in Malibu, but last month's Woolsey fire could prove to be the worst ever to strike the upscale coastal community.

At least 670 structures were destroyed inside the Malibu city limits, including more than 400 single-family homes with an estimated market value of at least \$1.6 billion, according to an analysis of aerial imagery and property records conducted by the Los Angeles Times and Zillow, the real estate website.

"There's so much destruction," said Chris Cortazzo, a Malibu real estate agent, who lost his home on Mulholland Highway, just outside the city. "Everyone's a little shell-shocked." It is very difficult to imagine the destruction these places have experienced unless we see them first hand. I believe it is also difficult for people to see the destruction sin brings to their souls because they do not physically see such destruction.

The fires of Malibu are estimated to have brought destruction in the \$1.6 billion dollar range. But consider this fact regarding your soul. Jesus once asked the following question, "What will it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul? (Matt. 16:26)

Did you catch what Jesus implied? Jesus was teaching that there is nothing more valuable than your soul! The destruction that "unforgiven" sin brings to your soul is eternal. We must realize before it is too late just how serious sin can be.
