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Confidence Corner **John F. Board**

In this week's *Confidence Corner* we will examine some thoughts regarding the distinctive nature of the New Testament Church. Too often these

fundamental teachings are overlooked and the result is confusion in new members and the younger generation. I hope these brief thoughts will provide some clarity.

In Daniel 2, Isaiah 2, and Joel 2 we have the opportunity to see the prophets of old referring to something special that was to come. They could know about this "Kingdom" that would never be destroyed because the God who intended this Kingdom (the Church) before the foundation of the world (Acts 2:23; Ephesians 1:3ff) was the God who was guiding the hands of those who wrote these words hundreds of years before this coming Kingdom would come to fruition.

Jesus Christ promised that He would build His Church (Kingdom) upon the confession that He was the Son of God (Matt. 16:13ff). When we compare Mark 9:1, Acts 1:8, and Acts 2 we see that His Kingdom came on Pentecost. Later, Paul would write about the Church, and he would declare that Christ was the head of the body, the Church (Col. 1:18). He also penned to those at Ephesus that there is "one body" (Eph. 4:1ff). The Church was so important that Luke records Paul's words that Christ purchased the Church with His Own blood."

All of the above indicates that God intended the Church to be very distinct. It is important that we understand this principle. We will continue some thoughts regarding this important concept Lord willing, next week.

1 Peter 3:8-9 says, "8 Finally, all of you, have unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, a tender heart, and a humble mind. 9 Do not repay evil for evil or reviling for reviling, but on the contrary, bless, for to this you were called, that you may obtain a blessing." Peter says when the world hates you and treats you wrong, don't respond in kind, but respond with love. When you are hated love, when you are cursed bless, when a person becomes your enemy pray for them. Peter says, "to this you were called..." What this means is that if you are a Christian, the responsibility God has given you is to love those who mistreat you. This is VERY difficult for us "normal folk" but through the power of God it's possible. Peter promises that even though the world may curse us, God will reward us for our faithfulness to Him. It will not always be fun, easy, or enjoyable but it will ALWAYS be worth it. Let's do our best to follow the example our Saviour set.
